Teresa – T Band

Mother Teresa was born in 1910. Aged eighteen she joined the Sisters of Loreto, in India. She taught in Calcutta but she saw suffering and poverty and it moved her to devote her life to working amongst the poorest in Calcutta.

Romero – R Band

Oscar Romero was born in El Salvador in 1917.In 1977 he became archbishop of San Salvador. He was a source of strength and hope for the poor, working with them and for them. Romero spoke out for the need for justice, and was often faced with danger from those against his ideas. On March 24th 1980, while celebrating the Eucharist, Archbishop Romero was shot and killed at the altar by a death squad assassin.





Where numbers are high for an option, we often run two groups.

Groups with low numbers may not run. We will consult students.

Students who do Separate science as their compulsory science will also have to take this as one of their options

Choices depend on progress and assessment in Year 9. Please ask at Parents' Evening.

Students should not choose the following together:

- Art & Ceramics
- Computing & ICT

For Languages, choose the subject studied in Year 9.

In BTEC, PSA assignments take place over set periods. Full attendance is required for full completion.

Thinking ahead

- Some A level subjects are more frequently required for a degree course than others.
- Facilitating subjects include: Maths; Physics; Biology; Chemistry; History; Geography; Modern languages; English
- Check University websites for their preferred subjects




Remind students to think carefully about

- All GCSE qualifications are examined at the end of the two year course.
- Internal assessment still remains part of the course for a few subjects.
- All GCSE subjects are graded on a nine point scale from 9-1 with 9 as the highest grade
- At OLCC, 5 GCSE or equivalent passes at Grade 4 or higher are required to continue the subject at A Level/Level 3 BTec

Why choose a BTec?



- Practical, real-world and skill development
- Can be taken alongside GCSEs
- Internal PSA assessment requires organisational skills, self-discipline, the ability to meet deadlines and independent study skills

Strong progression links on to A Level & Level 3 courses in 6th Form

New BTecs



- Are **NOT** the easy option.
- Deadlines must be met
- Assignments are taught through teaching and preparation tasks
- Final grades depend on the outcome of assessment tasks which can only be attempted once.
